Sticky Knowledge

South American countries include Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Guyana, Paraguay, Peru, Suriname, Uruguay and Venezuela. There are a variety of significant physical features in South America including the Amazon Rainforest and River, Andes mountain range, Iguazu falls, Colca Canyon, Lake Titicaca, Uyuni Salt Flats and Torres del Paine.

There are a number of significant human features in South America including Christ the Redeemer, Machu Picchu and the Maracana Football Stadium A rainforest is made up of 4 distinct layers: emergent, canopy, understory, shrub, forest floor.

Urbanisation is the process of making an area more urban due to the population shift in certain areas.

Push factors are what drive people away from an area and that pull factors are what attract people to an area.

Deforestation is the process of clearing away large numbers of trees. Favela means slum

Fauna found in South America can include dart frogs, anacondas, piranhas, macaws, toucans and jaguars.
